Re: Action on Healthcare problems

Dear Congressman McClintock,

I have looked at your website postings regarding the Affordable Care Act. Most are over three years old. In the most recent, in June 2016, you wrote a "Dear Neighbor:" piece noting that you were: "…*hearing from many constituents who have received notices that their healthcare premiums are skyrocketing, or their plans are being dropped either by their employers or their insurers, or that they are having hours cut back, salaries reduced or positions eliminated at work as employers try to cope with these increased costs.*"

I am writing to ask what you propose to do to ensure your constituents have affordable healthcare and don't lose the care they have now?

It is reported that the Republican leadership in Congress is proposing that you and other Republicans vote to do nothing constructive for three or four years.
